Warning after Hertfordshire resident is targeted by phone scammer

Police are once again reminding people to remain vigilant around unexpected phone calls after a Hertfordshire resident was targeted by a suspected phone scammer.



A Stevenage resident was called by someone, on Thursday September 7th, claiming to be from Herts Police. The caller said that the resident must pay a

fine relating to a traffic offence. Detectives are working to trace the person who made the call.

The police would never call and ask for a cash payment, so if you receive a call of this nature

please terminate the call and contact 101 immediately.

Anyone who has been called in similar circumstances is asked to contact police on the non-emergency 101.

Hertfordshire Constabulary's advice on unexpected phone calls

The police and banks would:

NEVER ask for your bank account details or PIN number over the phone, so do not disclose these to anyone, no matter who they claim to be.

NEVER ask you to withdraw money and send it to them via a courier, taxi or by any other means.

NEVER ask you to send your bank cards, or any other personal property, to them via courier, taxi or by any other means.

NEVER ask you to transfer money from one account to another over the telephone.

If you are not happy with a phone call and are suspicious of the conversation you have with the caller then please end the call and contact police via the non-emergency number, 101.

Remember, when reporting a suspicious phone call to police, wait at least five minutes before attempting to make the call or use a mobile or neighbour's phone to ensure you're not reconnected to the offender.

Did you know? Phones are now available that automatically block withheld numbers, which are often used by offenders. People's service providers may also be able to assist with blocking unwanted calls.

Help Hertfordshire Constabulary fight crime with phone app

A mobile phone or tablet app has been launched in Hertfordshire which gives opportunities for members of the public to help solve crime.

The 'Facewatch ID' app can be downloaded on many portable devices and offers the user the ability to scroll through photographs and identify people that Hertfordshire Constabulary would like to speak to in relation to crimes or as witnesses or victims. 'Facewatch ID' is also available for PC or Mac, with the user simply visiting a website to view the same images. Facewatch have provided the system for free to Hertfordshire Constabulary and intelligence officers will upload the images themselves, depicting people who are sought in connection with an incident or active investigation.

When opening the app, the user either inputs their post code, or the app automatically recognises their current location. They can then select a radius of up to 50 miles to display images of those who the police seek to identify. The user can then easily scroll through a gallery of images and, should they recognise any individual(s), they can simply fill out a form – completely anonymously – which is then submitted as a suggestion to the police. Should they also know the current address or whereabouts of the individual(s), this can also be included.

Hertfordshire Constabulary has, for some time, already has its own 'Wanted' section on the website, with numerous success stories of members of the public identifying individuals displayed on the web page. In addition, the Constabulary also posts the photographs on its Facebook page –

However, this new app offers a further way for members of the public to engage with police to help solve crime. It is anticipated that the app, which is very simple to use, will be extremely effective.
